

Assessing Publications Process-Maturity: The Experiences of Two Organizations at Different Levels of Process Maturity

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As Information Development organizations grow and mature, their organizational structure should grow and mature as well. The optimal structure for an organization in its early stages should focus on achieving stability and repeatable quality. As an organization matures, the optimal structure may need to be significantly different to develop a more thorough understanding of customers and contribute substantially to customer satisfaction.

ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE AND ITS IMPACT ON PROCESS MATURITY

Deborah Rosenquist will explain the evolution of Dell's Information Development Department and the Process Maturity evaluation that took place in August 1996. She will explain how Dell's organizational structure had an impact on the maturity level and how she plans to implement process improvements within three years and set long term goals for four to five years.

OVERVIEW OF THE PROCESS MATURITY MODEL

Dr. JoAnn Hackos and her team at Comtech evaluated two organizations at very different stages in their maturity: the technical publications, training, and translation organizations at SAP AG in Walldorf, Germany and the technical publications organization at Dell Computer in Austin, Texas.

In this presentation, Dr. Hackos will summarize the Publications Process Maturity Model (PPMM) and describe the five levels:

- Level 1: Ad hoc
- Level 2: Rudimentary
- Level 3: Organized and Repeatable
- Level 4: Managed and Sustainable
- Level 5: Optimizing

She will explain the assessment process and how results are reported to management and staff.
